Jamaica

AFRICA

Liberia

Monrovia—David DiCanio

Rev. Dave DiCanio continues to preach and teach, do the accounting work and government paperwork, and keep up with the everincreasing maintenance work on the compound in Duazon. Since coming back from vacation in the States, he has been attempting to catch up with the work.

The local electricity company has begun to distribute single-phase meters in the community around the compound, but unfortunately, it has decided not to distribute three-phase meters yet. Dave has been told the mission compound requires a three-phase meter because of its heavier load with the radio station. Once they get electricity, it should cut the running costs down significantly, although it is very likely the current will not be consistent.

The building project in Paynesville began to move forward again a few months ago when the cement roof was poured. The landlord has now finished his part of the project, and it has been handed over to Dave to oversee the inside work. The well has been reinforced and a pressure pump and water tank installed, razor wire installed on the compound wall, preliminary electrical work done, and under-floor plumbing is done. Plastering is in process, windows and doors are ordered, and the cement floor is soon to be poured. They have been using the unfinished building for meetings since mid-August, moving from one room to another as necessary.

The radio station is still running 24 hours a day, and they still get frequent visitors to the church because of it. Regular attenders at the church also testify that they are being blessed and edified through the preaching and teaching on the station. Please continue to pray for this wonderful means of outreach into the greater Monrovia area.

Monrovia—Joanne Greer

The mission church in Liberia held its annual vacation Bible school August 14–18 with 145 children divided into two groups. The seniors studied "What is a Christian?" and the juniors the "I Am" sayings of Christ. They were thankful to be able to hold the VBS in the new (though still unfinished) building. Dave DiCanio, Nathan Barco, and Joanne taught the lessons, and several other adults from the church assisted.

They restarted the Friday Bible club the week after VBS, after almost two years of a break due to the building situation. The thirty-plus children who have been attending include a few new children brought in from the VBS, which is an answer to prayer. Sunday school and the reading club continue as usual.

At the beginning of September the opportunity arose for Joanne to teach the children of two church families in a possible route into starting the Christian school. The Ministry of Education has given permission for her to do this in an unofficial capacity at this time, with a view to obtaining an operational permit perhaps sometime during this school year, once they have completed a couple of assessments. Although this would be a different route to getting a school started than Joanne had anticipated, it has its own set of benefits and has potential to grow into a

school of the ethos and quality for which she has been preparing.

One of the main differences is that they are experimenting with using a forms model, which means that in the twelve years that children usually spend in school, they pass through four forms rather than twelve grades. They spend approximately three years in each form, and promotion from form to form is mastery-based. Some subjects are taught to the whole form together (such as Bible, history, science, art, and music), and in other subjects (such as math and language arts) the students are taught individually or in very small groups.

This gives a lot more flexibility within each form to address individual needs of students and help them to catch up in specific subjects where they are struggling or have not been well taught. This is one main reason for Joanne's desire to try this model in Liberia. Another reason is that the forms model takes away the pressure to move children from grade to grade each year, which in Liberia often leads to "teaching to the test" or even to bribery. Although the forms model has been and is being used in other countries, it has not been tried before in Liberia, according to the Ministry of Education. So this is an experiment, and Joanne is very excited to be part of it!

Classes started on September 18, with two children in Form 1, three children in Form 2, and one member of support staff. They have been praying that the Lord would open the doors for a school in His way and time and are eager to see where this open door leads.

♦ Uganda

Nsaalu—Noreen McAfee

Noreen thanks the Lord for His continued mercy and grace. She says the school staff were greatly blessed through Mrs. Foster's lectures on Christian education and pray for God's help and wisdom to practice daily all that was taught.

They are now well into the third and final term of the school year. Noreen asks us to remember the Senior Four and Primary Seven candidates who will sit for their O-level and Primary Leaving examinations on October 6 and November 8 respectively. All the other classes will also do end-of-year assessments to qualify for the next class.

Noreen says it is a busy term, but they are looking to the Lord to carry them through. Pray that God would be glorified, not just in the academic achievements, but in the salvation and spiritual growth of the students.

Kiyimba Shalif, one of their bursary students, recently passed his final examinations for the Certificate in Comprehensive Nursing. Noreen thanks God for His goodness to this young man and also requests prayer for the other fourteen young people who are enrolled in various vocational courses.

The outreach Sunday school in Kyambala II began on August 6. Over 160 children are already on the roll. Most are from Roman Catholic and Muslim homes and have little or no knowledge of the Bible. A couple of parents have attended including a Muslim lady who has come on several occasions. Pray that the children would attend regularly, that the light of the gospel would shine into their darkened hearts, and that God would provide a better location for the Sunday school. They are currently meeting in a small garage and spilling out onto the ground in front.

As an update on previous requests, Noreen says that Douglas and Victoria were blessed with a healthy baby boy, but sadly, Ronald and Jascent's baby girl was stillborn. Meanwhile, their little leukemia patient, Nassiwa Sylvia, has commenced her third round of chemotherapy and continues to make progress. Please keep all these families in prayer.

Nsaalu—Ray & Rhonda Carscadden

The Carscaddens have been in Uganda for over three months now and say it has been a time of much activity and blessing. In August, the first Ugandan pastors' conference went well with approximately sixty men in attendance, including some men from Kenya. The FPC of Ulster's Mission Board secretary, Rev. David McMillan, and the Moderator, Rev. John Armstrong, participated along with Rev. Ray Carscadden. The theme was "Pastoring a Healthy Church."

The following Lord's Day, a special welcome service was held for the Carscaddens with Mr. McMillan leading the service and Mr. Armstrong preaching and offering prayer for them. Since that time there have been many blessings and tokens for good. They have seen some souls saved and others showing an interest in the gospel.

The weekly prison ministry has been very encouraging. Two men there recently professed faith in Christ. One had been heavily involved in witchcraft and the other had been a Muslim. Both men had been transferred to the prison just the day before. The prisoners requested that the church supply them with hymn books so that they could sing hymns during the week. Mr. Carscadden says when he visited the prison for the first time last year

and passed out hymn sheets, the prisoners pretended that they couldn't read. An amazing change has occurred in that place since then. One prisoner said it is now a common sight to see men all around the prison reading their Bibles when they get an opportunity.

Mr. Carscadden gives all glory to God for these blessings and is thankful for prayer for his family and for the work at Emmanuel.

♦ Kenya

Kitali—Malcolm & Alison Patterson

The visit of the Youth Council Team from Northern Ireland in August went well. The team members were kept busy as they visited the different areas of the work in Kenya. The first week was spent on the Kitale side visiting the three churches there. A youth conference was held on Thursday when the youth from all three congregations attended. In addition, the team members went on outreach and visited in some of the homes of the congregations.

After the first week, the team headed to Kakamega where there are two churches. They took part in Sunday school, church, VBS, prayer meetings, and a youth conference held in the church in Nyaporo.

One of the team members, Elizabeth Edwards, who has completed her Whitefield College Course, stayed for a further ten days after the rest of the team left. She visited the nursery school at Nyaporo and took part in the Sunday school there. The last part of her stay was back in Kitale where she assisted with cataloguing the books that had just arrived from Northern Ireland and did other routine tasks.

The Pattersons are happy to report that two new congregations are in the process of being welcomed into Glory Bible Church: one in Kitalale outside Kitale and the other in Ortum. Joseph Methu has been pastoring the work in Kitalale for about seven years. Victor Kiptanui has just graduated from Faith College of the Bible in Eldoret and is pastoring the work in Ortum. Please pray for them.

Five young people were baptized in the swimming pool at the Golf Hotel on August 26 and received into membership on October 1 in Kakamega Church. On that day the Lord's Table was held for the first time in Kakamega Church. Also, Pastor Patrice's son Nathan was dedicated August 27. Another dedication service was held in Nyaporo where 21 children were dedicated! This was the first-ever dedication service there so babies and children of all ages with their parents filled up the front of the church. The Pattersons say it was a remarkable sight.

Before the Pattersons leave again for Northern Ireland, they will have the opportunity to distribute much literature at the Kitale Agricultural Show October 18–21. The children's tracts were printed in time for distribution at the August VBSs and will also be used at the show. Teams from the churches on the Kitale side—Bikeke, Shimo la Tewa, and Tantana, plus the two new congregations—will assist with this outreach work.

Tracey has been getting tests and is awaiting results to see whether she can yet return to India to receive the bone marrow transplant.

Pray for the pastors and leaders in Kenya, the Sunday school teachers, and the bookshop staff; for the radio broadcasts and the book table outreaches; for workers to be raised up in Kenya and for missionaries to be thrust forth into this work. The Patterons say, "There is much still to be accomplished in this land. Pray for us as we travel home again, planning to return in the spring (DV) for our final three-month term in Kenya.
