Eduardo Peña, Mr. Jair Aguilar, and Mr.
Wenceslao Vergara—joined Mr. Sosa and Mr.
Rubén Ramírez in the Dominican Republic
for a week of praying, planning, and working
on shaping what will eventually be a Latin
American presbytery. The pastors were able
to strengthen the bonds of brotherhood as
sister churches.

Also during this week, the Latin American Presbytery Commission met with them online on two occasions: the first to interview the pastors who are requesting to come under the care of the presbytery and the other to analyze the finances of the church.

Please pray for the Word of Life Educational Center (CEPVI). Requests for new children to enter preschool and daycare have increased, but they have very limited space. Pray also for the church since they sometimes run out of room in their church building for some of the Sunday meetings. Pray for Ramón as he studies and preaches and also as he advises those who need help with spiritual and emotional matters. Pray for Ruben as he continues his internship and for his wife, Cinthya, as she helps in the preschool. Finally, please pray for Brother Emilio Ozuna (82), who was hospitalized for a week due to hypoglycemia. Unfortunately, he has had to start on dialysis. Pray that the Lord will provide the necessary resources to cover the costs of the treatment and that He will take care of Emilio and protect him.

◆ Mexico

Mexico City—Jason & Danielle Boyle

Since returning from part one of their deputation in the United States, the Boyles have jumped right back into their full workload.

The first week of February was the Latin American Week of Prayer in the Dominican Republic. Lalo, Jason, Wences, and Jair were able to travel to the DR for the week to visit Ramón and Rubén, their families, and the church in Los Frailes, Santo Domingo. They had blessed times of prayer and preaching and were able to advance well through the Presbytery business including meeting with the Latin American Commission online, advancing plans for a Spanish FPC hymnal, and preparing for family camp. Family camp will be at the beginning of May and will bring together families from all of the Latin American sister churches.

At the Boyles' church in Mexico City Jason is continuing with their series in the Psalms. As he has been preaching on the Psalms he is also making progress putting together a Spanish Psalter. He is about halfway through collecting Psalms for the work. Some of them are already

translated into Spanish and put to music; others he is translating himself and sometimes also writes the music himself. Jason is taking a break from extra studies now but will soon start up some more studies with the focus on training more men. Danielle and the boys are right back into homeschooling. She spoke at their women's breakfast on February 8th.

In January Jason was invited to preach at a church in Puebla that wants to join a presbyterian denomination. This past week that church suffered violence from a criminal group of drug dealers. The group threw punches at some men of the church, threw stones at their vehicles, and vandalized the church. The pastor's vehicle had its windshield and side mirror broken. Please pray that the church will stand in its community as a shining light for God's glory.

Please pray that God would continue to bless the Mexico City church and its ministries, the preaching of God's Word every Sunday, the evangelism efforts, and the Bible studies.

Córdoba—Lalo & Liz Peña

Rev. Lalo Peña thanks God that the congregation in Córdoba remains firm in its zeal to share the gospel with family and friends.

They continue to pray for the future visit of a lady who attended the charismatic congregation of which Lalo was previously the pastor. An update from the FPCNA Mission Board dated February 10, 2025:

"Dear brethren.

"Thank you for your faithful support of the work in Liberia. Your prayers and practical giving are much appreciated. We also give our thanks to Rev. Derrick Bowman and his family for their recent eight-week visit to give practical and spiritual help in the work.

"The recent changes in ministry leadership have meant an adjustment of oversight in the Paynesville congregation, the residence compound, and the radio ministry. The Mission Board has appointed an overseeing session of three members of the Mission Board: Rev. Derrick Bowman, Rev. Armen Thomassian, and Rev. Logan Elder. These men are working closely with the church and specifically with Pastor Moses Dahn, the appointed minister, and Mr. Nathan Barco, the appointed deacon. Pastor Dahn and Mr. Barco have been part of the work since 2006 when Dr. Mark Allison first went to Liberia. Nathan was saved at that time under Mark's ministry.

"Rev. Bowman was encouraged to see the renewed interest of the congregation in the ministry in both practical and spiritual ways. The bookstore, and NGO headquarters, has been revitalized and Pastor Dahn is now helping in that work and using the premises as a place to study. The need for Bibles and good

literature, made available to the community, is a vital part of the work.

"Our Mission Board is working closely with the Ulster Mission Board and LTBS on restarting the radio station. A high-speed internet connection is soon to be installed at the compound which will allow the station to be operated remotely along with local help.

"In God's work often there are times of upset and circumstances that cause disruption. But we trust in a sovereign Lord who does all things well. We encourage every congregation to pray earnestly for blessing and increase in the Paynesville church and especially that Pastor Dahn and Mr. Barco will be endued with power and wisdom from God to press forward in the extension of Christ's kingdom.
